ISSUE/PROPOSAL STATEMENT: Eliminate/Evaluate limitations placed on the sale of City Assets, specifically §7-1205 (Public Lighting), §7-1404 (Transportation), and §7-1504 (Water & Sewerage).	
RATIONALE: "A 3/5 vote of the people is required to "sell or in any way dispose of any property needed to continue the operation of any city owned public utility furnishing lighting" or to "grant any public utility franchise for public lighting which is not subject to revocation at the will of the city council." The same limitations are stated for the Transportation and Detroit	

<u>Discussion</u>. The mayor has stated his intent to decommission the power generation facilities managed by the Public Lighting Department, recognizing the city's competitive disadvantage providing this type of infrastructure in the high technology age. While the value of these assets is hard to quantify, the unmet capital requirements of each are prohibitive to the city (maybe in the hundreds of millions of dollars), as is keeping up with the increasing pace of technological and management change in the area. As well, with regional development patterns in the postwar period, these types of services have become increasingly unusual to municipalities.
